Making an impact in Northern Ireland

We received 111 entries, more than ever before, more awards than ever before, more sponsors and supporters and nearly 300 guests to celebrate the achievements of AHPs and healthcare scientists.

By this we mean such impact as freeing up clinical time, cutting waiting lists, reducing emergency admissions or shortening hospital stays as well as empowering patients in selfcare and improving the quality of care.

Focusing on you – maximising the benefits of sponsorship

Joy Shepherd, our marketing and programme development manager, who has been involved in many Focus Weeks, shares some tips on how to get the most from it.

The idea of the Focus Week for our award sponsors is so that we offer each award its own focused time. Of course we also encourage sponsors to promote their award and the whole programme throughout the entry period. We make this as easy as possible for you with media releases, banners and other materials to use on social media.

We will agree with you well in advance the date that works best for you during the entry period. It is usually best to avoid times when you have major events that generate their own social media. We avoid the Christmas/New Year weeks as focus is usually elsewhere.

Ideas to try include:

 If you are a regular sponsor, look back at previous winners – ask them for quotes, link to their case study, create a story (eg the father and daughter team that won overall winner), use photos or videos of winners at the awards ceremony

- If you are a new sponsor, use the Week to announce why you are supporting the awards and why people should enter
- Remember the Week is to promote your award, but it is also to promote your organisation and its current activities
- If you can, plan a week's worth of social media activity so that interest builds with a different 'story' each day
- Link to blogs, and upcoming events on your website
- Pick a week when you can link to a particular, relevant theme – eg World Mental Health Day or Sustainability awareness
- Ensure that you tag influencers in your world, which is great way to help smaller organisations punch above their weight.
- And do call on our experience if you need some fresh ideas.

Celebrating the impact of AHPs and healthcare scientists in Northern Ireland and beyond

A record number of entries were received this year, so the judges' task was considerable. Our aim is to clearly spell out what these examples of innovative practice mean in the context of the impact on patients, and the health and social care services.

The winners are announced at a dinner on 10 October at the Stormont Hotel, Belfast. Here are the shortlisted entries with a short summary of their potential or real impact:

AWARD FOR CREATIVE AND **INNOVATIVE PRACTICE**

Dysphagia training, leading the way across the UK

Alison Ferris, AHP Consultant, Public Health Agency, and Fiona McCallion, Assistant Head, HSC Clinical Education Centre Impact: providing training packages to the public and healthcare staff increased awareness of eating, drinking and swallowing difficulties, freeing up clinical time to help bring waiting lists down.

Northern Ireland Ambulance Service cardiac arrest masterclass project Clinical Education Team, Northern Ireland Ambulance Service

Impact: this new approach and vision is changing the culture of education and training in NIAS, focusing on nontechnical skills, teamwork and life-saving interventions with the aim of improving survival rates.

Sensory Motor Circuits in Primary Schools Children Core Occupational Therapy team and RISE NI Occupational Therapy team, Southern Health and Social Care Trust Impact: teachers and classroom assistants can now access training and resources to support children with OT needs ensuring early intervention and building capacity to reduce waiting times for OT services.

AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE **IN CANCER CARE**

Service Improvement Team, Northern Health and Social Care Trust Impact: Filling a gap in available information to patients with advanced cancer, this project used an exemplary model of co-design to create a strong service- user focused service. The toolkit is accessible to anyone, easy to update and readily replicable.

AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE **IN A SUPPORT ROLE**

Personalised memory aids Julie McCullough, Rehabilitation Coach, South Eastern Health and Social Care Trust Impact: working alongside people with brain injury and their families to co-produce memory aids, tailored

to individual needs to enhance daily functioning and quality of life. Now being widely adopted.

Swallow Aware Campaign

Alison McCusker, Project Manager for Dysphagia NI, Public Health Agency Impact: supporting people with eating, drinking and swallowing difficulties by engaging with service users, families and healthcare professionals; harnessing communication routes and social media to reach out to the hospitality industry, to prevent hospital admissions.

Podiatry Assistant Practitioner, providing support, advice and foot health education for patient living with diabetes Northern Ireland Regional Podiatry Assistant Practitioners teams Impact: podiatry assistant practitioners, now in all five Trusts, help patients to manage their own foot care and to understand risk factors so maximising the resource available to the podiatry service.

Exploring access to community neurorehabilitation for people with progressive neurological conditions

Shona Pryde, Advanced Practitioner Physiotherapist, Belfast Health and Social Care Trust and co-authors Owen Williams, Margaret O'Hare, Carolyn Murdock and Dr Katy Pedlow

Impact: this research has enhanced understanding of key healthcare issues to improve holistic care of people living with PNC, highlighting what good access should look like from their perspective and how it can be implemented.

An evaluation of the demographics, characteristics and healthcare utilisation of people with asthma referred to an Ambulatory Respiratory Hub

Wesley Henry, Advanced Practitioner Physiotherapist, South Eastern Health and Social Care Trust

Impact: the Hub has reduced pressure on hospital services and pressure on primary care for patients with poorly controlled asthma, demonstrating that ambulatory care should be considered as an alternative to hospital admission.

AWARD FOR OUTSTANDING LEADERSHIP

Milkshakes Matter: a collaborative approach to enhancing the nutritional and dysphagia care of frail nursing home residents

Heather Stevenson, Speech and Language Therapist, and Katherine Hudson, Dietitian, Northern Health and Social Care Trust Impact: a collaborative improvement initiative which enhanced the quality and safety of nutritional and dysphagia care, demonstrating strong leadership, excellent partnership working to improve patient safety and care.

Northern Ireland quality standard for imaging team

Richard Gould, Senior Project Manager, Regional Medical Imaging Board, Strategic Planning and Performance Group, Department of Health, Mark Cadden, Quality Standard for Imaging Lead, South Eastern Health and Social Care Trust and the team across Southern, Western, Northern, and Belfast Health and Social Care Trusts Impact: they embedded the Quality Standard for Imaging and other awards of Accreditation to give third party recognition that imaging services show competence to deliver high quality services by competent staff in a safe environment.

Respiratory Investigation and Sleep Diagnostic Service

Lisa McManus, Chief Respiratory Physiologist, Western Health and Social Care Trust

Impact: this important service allowed patients to access essential investigations close to home so providing excellent care across many specialties, increasing service capacity and reducing waiting times.

Northern Ireland Healthcare Science steering group

Sinead Fitzpatrick, Senior Cardiac Physiologist, Letterkenny University Hospital and Western Health and Social Care Trust

Impact: Healthcare Science group emerged on a virtual platform during COVID and has developed fast to support healthcare scientists across NI, with such issues as education and training and patient safety.

AWARD FOR OUTSTANDING SERVICE DELIVERY BY AN AHP OR HEALTHCARE SCIENTIST WORKING OUTSIDE THE NHS

Replicating the primary care role Jamie Scott, Primary Care Paramedic, GP Federation of NI and Lecturer of Paramedic Science, Ulster University

Impact: this pilot project expanded patients access to care, streamlined service delivery and addressed gaps in the system; with the potential to transform not only frontline service delivery but also building new ways to enhance the workforce.

Addressing a critical gap in mental health support for children

Louise Kelly and Karen Diamond, Music Therapists, Resilient Rhythms

Impact: whole class workshops empower teachers and children to understand and manage mental health challenges with practical tools and strategies to prevent crisis and foster resilience.

AWARD FOR PARTNERSHIP WORKING IN PUBLIC HEALTH

Claire Hallowell, Complex Case Team Manager, and Aidan McDonnell, Complex Case Team Paramedic, Northern Ireland Ambulance Service, with the collaborative team at the British Red Cross Impact: this addressed the issue of Ambulance Service Frequent Callers, ensuring that their health and social care needs are met while reducing demand for ambulance services and emergency departments – and with an estimated net annual saving of £1.3m.

Options, advice, knowledge osteoarthritis knee: The OAK programme West Belfast

Arlene Blair, First Contact Physiotherapy Practitioner West Belfast Federation, and Trudy Matchett, Belfast Health and Social Care Trust

Impact: the OAK programme (Options, Advice and Knowledge) helps people with knee osteoarthritis to access support for exercise, weight and pain management to self-manage effectively and reduce reliance on medical services where there are long delays.

Live well for a longer healthy life Suzanne Kennedy, Consultant Physiotherapist, Northern Health and Social Care Trust and Nuala Lamont, Senior Practice Manager, Causeway GP Federation Impact: this project showed that small changes can make profound health improvements, reducing risk of obesityrelated health conditions, referring patients to a healthy lifestyle programme, encourage behavioural changes with increased physical activity.

AWARD FOR SERVICE IMPROVEMENT

The Speech and Language Therapy led ENT Parallel clinic service – a transformational pathway

Carolyn Greer and Laura Connolly, Specialist Advanced Practitioner Speech and Language Therapists, South Eastern Health and Social Care Trust Impact: an advanced practitioner SLT- led clinic has reduced wait by over 7 years for patients with voice and upper airway conditions, with approximately 90% never having to see an ENT doctor, and 70% not needing further input from SLT.

Northern Ireland Ambulance Service Integrated Clinical Hub

Karl Bloomer, Consultant Paramedic (Urgent Care), Northern Ireland Ambulance Service

Impact: this directs 999 callers to the most appropriate healthcare at the point of their call, ensuring they Get It Right First Time for patients, making emergency ambulances more readily available to get to the sickest, quickest with potential savings of £200 per Hear and Treat call.





Expansion of Southern Trust Acute Care at Home Team

Niamh Canavan, Physiotherapist, Catherine Murchan, Occupational Therapist, and Yvonne Hanna, Team Manager, Acute Care at Home Team, Southern Health and Social Care Trust Impact: this hospital at home service has reduced inappropriate referrals from hospital by 25%, demonstrating value for money by bed days saved, while being able to treat unwell older people at home. Development plans are in place.

Occupational Therapy – advanced practice microneedling service in the Royal Victoria Hospital, Regional Burns Unit

Ursula Kelly, Occupational Therapy Assistant Service Manager, and Jude Gordon, Clinical Lead Occupational Therapist, Belfast Health and Social Care Trust

Impact: advanced practice OTs use microneedling techniques to improve burns scars and so improving psychosocial wellbeing for patients, while reducing the need for surgery and freeing up surgeons' time.

AWARD FOR THE BEST COLLABORATION ACROSS CLINICAL, ACADEMIA AND INDUSTRY

Development of bespoke virtual therapymodernising treatment delivery, utilising current resources efficiently and meeting NICE guidelines

Emma Dunn, Occupational Therapist Advanced Practitioner Level 2, and Dermot Quinn, Occupational Therapist, Belfast Health and Social Care Trust, in collaboration with eXRt Intelligent Healthcare

Impact: patients are more motivated and engaged, with increased adherence to rehab plans, so speeding up recovery time, increasing capacity and speeding up hospital discharge. Easy to use, and adaptable to various OT environments.

Out of hospital cardiac arrest 5-year review research study

Julia Wolfe, Research and Development Manager, and Emma McCorkell, Research Paramedic, Northern Ireland Ambulance Service, in collaboration with Professor Adele Marshall and Dr Aleks Novakovic from Queen's University Belfast, funded by Northern Ireland Chest Heart and Stroke Impact: with NIAS becoming a more research-active organisation, this five-year retrospective review of Out of Hospital Cardiac Arrest aims to improve survival rates and patient outcomes by developing new services and streamlining existing processes.

ADVOCATE - advancing radiotherapy techniques as a team

The FAST clinic team, Northern Ireland Cancer Care Centre. Team represented by Stacey Conway, lead clinical research radiographer, NI Cancer Trials Network, Grace Totten, clinical research radiographer, NI Cancer Trials Network and Sarah-Jane Flynn, urology site specialist radiographer.

Impact: this innovative clinic enables patients to access advanced image guided radiotherapy techniques through prostate cancer clinical trials, reducing radiotherapy from 39 treatments to five, saving 134 hours of radiotherapy, enabling more patients to be treated faster.

Showcasing AHP research in Northern Ireland

Over 115 allied health professionals attended the inaugural Northern Ireland AHP Research and Innovation Conference on 11th September in the Balmoral Hotel in Belfast with the theme of *Embracing a population health approach*.

The day was opened by chief AHP officer, Michelle Tennyson, and featured keynote presentations and discussions on:

- **Community appointment days:** an experiment in new models of care from Laura Finucane and Natalie Blunt, Sussex MSK Partnership Central
- Causeway Healthy Kids project from Claire Galway, Belfast Health & Social Care Trust
- Act Now: Tackling Health Inequalities in MSK by Sue Brown, CEO of Arthritis and Musculoskeletal Alliance (ARMA)
- Learnings from a Churchill Fellowship from Heather McFarlane, Public Health Agency.

With 48 contributors spread across two rooms, the engaging and interactive platform presentations, rapid 5 presentations and poster presentations stimulated discussion, maximised shared learning and generated networking opportunities.

The conference emphasised the importance of supporting and developing new AHP researchers with a session on how to obtain future funding for AHPs' research time via the NI Health and Social Care Research Resilience and Growth funding scheme.
