The Contribution of a Dietitian to a Midwifery-led Healthy Pregnancy Clinic

Orla Adams, Dietetic Lead for Maternal Weight Management

Cardiff and Vale University Health Board

This innovative project focuses on both minimising weight gain in pregnancy for women with a BMI > 40 kg/m² and increasing women's engagement in the weight management pathway postpartum, thereby reducing risks to both mother and baby. It is a sensitive subject that health professionals often find difficult to discuss with patients, often feeling overwhelmed with how to help people manage it. Pregnant women with a BMI >40 kg/m² were not previously offered a dietetic intervention but this is now part of the pathway.

Orla is a member of MINT (Motivational Interviewing Network of Trainers) and has been learning Motivational Interviewing (MI) since 2006. The spirit of MI includes working in partnership with people, showing empathy, taking a compassionate approach and empowering people to feel able to make changes. Orla embodies this spirit and models these intentions in communication with her patients. An innovative contribution to future generations with the potential for significant public health impact, along with a passionate and committed desire to share good practice and upskill others

Multi-disciplinary workshops supporting pre-school children with social and communication difficulties

Kerri Evans, Clinical Strategic Lead Occupational Therapist for Autistic Spectrum Disorder on behalf of the multi-disciplinary team, Aneurin Bevan University Health Board

Kerri Evans and the team have provided multi-disciplinary workshops to provide early intervention and support. The team worked collaboratively across seven professions to deliver four two-hour workshops to parents on areas of development typically challenged in pre-school children with social and communication difficulties. They overcame barriers of silo working with little additional resource to work differently to meet a gap in service provision, increase ease of access to a range of services and upskill and empower parents.

Although at an early stage, the workshops are having a positive impact on the families who access them. Providing easy access to specialist knowledge and creating opportunities for social connectedness between parents have resulted in positive reported qualitative data.

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Healthcare Scientists supporting the COVID-19 Vaccination Programme, the Welsh Blood Service role

Hospital Services Team – Stephen Pearce, Head of Manufacturing & Distribution and Sharon Hamer, Lead Scientist, Hospital Services, Welsh Blood Service

The Hospital Services Team rapidly developed and implemented an efficient mechanism for the national storing and distribution of COVID-19 vaccines, enabling Wales to be one of the fastest countries in the world to vaccinate communities, reducing the infection and mortality rates in the Welsh population. The team provide an excellent model for successful multi-disciplinary team working in an extremely high-pressured environment. They recognised the project's vital importance to public health and pulled together to meet Welsh Government timelines and targets. Through sheer determination, the team embedded the vaccine distribution service whilst maintaining the quality and distribution of all blood components.

The team leaders influenced and motivated the team, maintaining momentum and ensuring the timely delivery of the project, while also maintaining calm and controlled approaches to stressful situations.

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AWARD FOR OUTSTANDING CONTRIBUTION TO RESEARCH DELIVERY

John Rice, Clinical Specialist Physiotherapist and Physiotherapy Research Lead

John has stepped into a new role, leading the physiotherapy research portfolio for CTMUHB, doing so with passion, enthusiasm and attention to detail. He has been funded by Health and Care Research Wales to undertake a new Research Physiotherapist role, the first of its kind. John has set about embedding an innovative, positive research culture in the workforce.

John has brought in 5 research portfolio studies and facilitated 10 members of staff to be actively involved in clinical research. He has also supported colleagues through GCP training and is collaborating with academic colleagues in Cardiff Met and Cardiff University to support publication of key research workstreams. His work is directly impacting on patient care with research that will influence changes to patient pathways. John has clarity of how research delivery fits within a wider context of service improvement, evaluation and innovation – he clearly sees the link between research and real patient benefits and outcomes.

Andrew was given a secondment opportunity, funded by Health and Care Research Wales, to help reduce the clinical burden on therapy staff either completing or wanting to start a research trial. Andrew is now working to set-up and support trial delivery across the Cardiff and Vale UHB portfolio of therapy-led studies.

He has made a significant contribution to improving the visibility of therapies-led research to patients and the public and has streamlined patient access to novel interventions. Since joining the team there has been a substantial increase in recruitment to a number of high profile funded therapy-led portfolio studies.

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AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN REHABILITATION

The CAVUHB rehabilitation model The rehabilitation model team Cardiff and Vale University Health Board

The CAVUHB rehabilitation model is a recovery- focused rehabilitation model to address health inequalities by optimising health and supporting self-management. The model guides co-production and co-delivery of a growing range of community interventions and networks, in multiple formats, directly accessed according to individual need. It's a significant paradigm shift; based on partnership working, high value, sustainable, community supported health generating activities. Current services include Long Covid recovery, prepare well for surgery and supporting people to live well with musculoskeletal conditions.

Co-production is at the centre of this development, including partnership with Recovery College and ImROC and a bi-weekly Co-production Forum that brings together the voices, actions and contributions of service users, 3rd sector, community and healthcare to achieve a common goal. An excellent example of transforming and embedding holistic, coproduced, sustainable rehabilitation services that are multi-disciplinary, high quality and integrated with community and third sector partners across a range of services.

Cancer related fatigue management – self-management pilot project

Jackie Pottle, Macmillan Cancer AHP Lead, and Lisa Heaton-Brown, Consultant Clinical Psychologist, Betsi Cadwaladr University Health Board

The aim of this project was to develop CRF self-management resources for patients and for healthcare practitioners to support patients to live as fully as possible. This included the development of Health Board wide Sharepoint site to allow quick access to evidence- based information; varied patient support services, such as telephone support and stand-alone educational sessions that were hybrid, virtual, and face to face; video group clinics (providing education and peer support); and a series of education sessions to promote all resources and a range of patient support services.

Ongoing engagement has led to adaptations in referral mechanisms and service user recorded feedback to promote and support the impact of the service.

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Early supported discharge Pembrokeshire

Ceri Dean, Clinical Lead Occupational Therapist and Jillian Turfery, Clinical Lead Physiotherapist, Early supported discharge team for stroke services in Pembrokeshire, Hywel Dda University Health Board

An early supported discharge service for stroke has been set up in beautiful and rural Pembrokeshire. The service aims to support people living in Pembrokeshire who have experienced a stroke to return home from hospital sooner and recover, through the provision of home-based rehabilitation. The development of the team has been led by the acute stroke team and it provides a bridge between the acute hospital and community services.

Previous pilots have gathered service users feedback of a general feeling of 'abandonment' once leaving hospital after their acute stay following their stroke. The Service aimed to address this for the Pembrokeshire population, to return home from hospital sooner and recover, through the provision of individualised home-based rehabilitation.

Innovative Integration: Enhanced Community Services for Care Home Residents by Allied Health Professionals

It follows a simple pathway that can be easily scaled up across Wales. The project has three aims: to provide multidisciplinary training to care home staff to manage risks while health services are recovering after the pandemic; Co-design an efficient integrated clinical pathway with multiple stakeholders and to explore comprehensive outcome measures to include efficiency, hospital avoidance

An innovative cost-neutral multi-disciplinary service, improving access and equality; it empowers nursing home staff and the community.

Breath of fresh air! Keeping Children and Young People with complex disability well at home

Paediatric Respiratory Physiotherapy Rapid Response Outreach-In Reach Team Mari Powell and Briony Guerin, Specialist Paediatric Physiotherapists, Swansea Bay University Health Board

Through baseline lung function assessment, provision of comprehensive baseline and escalation treatment plans for home and school setting and robust competency-based training for parents/carers/school staff, this project has empowered those closest to the child to manage their respiratory needs at home. The first pilot project of its kind in Wales, this service has delivered cost-effective, prudent, innovative, sustainable healthcare based upon population health strategies. Streamlined pathways, care closer to home, preventative initiatives, collaborative working, innovative drug regimens, education and training have delivered cost/social-benefit preventing hospital admissions and supporting early discharge

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Radiotherapy Target Definition by Clinical Technologists – Implementation of 'Non-Medical Outlining' as a transformative development

Lucy Wills, Principal Treatment Planning Healthcare Scientist, Velindre Cancer Centre

By increasing the pool of staff performing target definition, this project is creating greater clinical capacity for newly referred non-surgical oncology patients to be seen, and flexibility to shorten and improve their pathway from referral to treatment, thereby resulting in reduced waiting times and better outcomes in line with new national radiotherapy treatment targets.

The working model revolves around technologically advanced meetings, where targets are discussed alongside oncologists, trainee oncologists and radiographers. Processes are smoothed and individual patient issues are decisively resolved.

The development of a pan Wales Occupational Therapy ovarian cancer prehabilitation service

This project is a collaborative approach to develop equitable and consistent educational sessions and online support to enable behavioural change and self-management for symptoms of anxiety and fatigue and their impact on wellbeing. It has improved the support that ovarian cancer patients receive prior and during treatment. Working across 3 cancer sites the team created and delivered an interactive self – management prehabilitation programme to support patients with behavioural change in preparation for upcoming treatment.

The Emergency Communication Nurse System Implementation Team

ECNS Project Team

Welsh Ambulance Service NHS Trust

The Emergency Communication Nurse system is a secondary triage system that is used to triage 999 calls, ensuring prudent healthcare. The system provides over 200 evidence based clinical algorithms to support clinical decision making in the telephone triage environment. The system includes a robust quality management system to ensure continued high-quality care and targeted education opportunities. The system has only previously been licensed for use by nurses. Dr Mike Brady, using extensive research, proposed a pilot for Welsh Ambulance Service to be the first service to use the system with paramedics. Following implementation WAST will apply to be the first UK ambulance service with paramedics to apply for Accredited Centre of Excellence

Impressive impact on patients, workforce sustainability and benefits to multiple staff groups; of worldwide interest.

The project is forming part of a research study into triage outcomes from nurses and paramedics, looking at potential differences in skillset and outcomes, which is being shared internationally.

Keepingmewell.com and patient engagement

Keeping Me Well team, Huw Davies, Lead for Keeping Me Well, Cardiff and Vale University Health Board

Designed in response to the pandemic to support the community and particularly those adversely affected by changes in provision health services, Keepingmewell. com is Cardiff and Vale UHB's bilingual digital rehabilitation resource that service users can access for information to support their health and wellbeing. The website has been co-designed with CAVUHB's Live Well co-production forum and multi-disciplinary professionals and provides information that supports self-management to enable service users to live well. The site provides condition specific information as well as highlighting users to local community services that can support their health and wellbeing. The aim is to wrap the services around the individual by providing useful information, condition management advice and signposting to local support.

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Virtual Reality – the future for education and simulation

Tracheostomy Team, Cardiff and Vale University Health Board

In conjunction with industry, and supported by the Cardiff Capital Region and the SBRI, the team rapidly developed a virtual reality solution for the delivery of vital tracheostomy education, and provided proof of concept for bronchoscopy training and chest drain insertion. The VR solution was designed by clinical experts and based on core educational principles to ensure fully immersive experiences on both a single and multi-user basis. The VR solution uses a combination of immersive 180 degree videos, VR based scenarios and multiuser scenarios which can be completed at any time, in any location with participants not restricted to classrooms or simulation suites. This solution has the potential to transform the way that education is delivered, either through a hybrid or total virtual process, and to create the platform for future developments in all aspects of health care.

Judyth Jenkins Head of Nutrition and Dietetic Services (Retired) Cardiff and Vale University Health Board

Judyth's career started 45 years ago, undertaking leadership roles initially as Head of Dietetics in CRI, later the Head of Dietetics across Cardiff and Vale UHB. She has at times simultaneously held roles as interim directorate manager for the Renal Service, and later interim Head of Speech and Language Therapy Services. During her extraordinary service, Judyth demonstrated inspirational leadership. Retirement plans were deferred in 2020 ensuring support during this challenging period for the NHS. Displaying energy, passion and collaboration across workforces she ensured nutritional needs of patients were met, unfailingly safeguarding care standards in spite of the pandemic.

Judyth has worked tirelessly and passionately advocating for the role of nutrition in bettering the health and Judith never lost sight of the patient. She was always patient focused, promoting patient care; a trailblazer for the profession, forward thinking, horizon scanning.

Ed Harry, Advanced Paramedic Practitioner, Welsh Ambulance Service NHS Trust

Ed has embraced the ethos of an advanced practitioner, working across the four pillars of advanced practice and continually pushing himself and others around him to succeed. Ed has been one of the key contributors to the recent 'Navigator' trial in Swansea Bay, acting as a senior clinician supporting staff and patients with safe alternatives to ED and reducing conveyance and presentations at hospital through remote consultation. As IT infrastructure changed, Ed was instrumental in training and developing staff to undertake remote consultation allowing the model to develop at pace.

The vision to expand out remote consultation capabilities features in the strategic direction of the trust and Ed has been key to delivering this.

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Kerrie Phipps, National AHP Lead for Primary and Community Care, Strategic Programme for Primary Care

Kerrie is transforming how AHPs are deployed to work in primary care, including developing workforce principles, professional collaboratives, and the use of technology consultations during thepandemic. She is changing the understanding of what AHPs offer in Primary Care. Kerrie has clarified the model for increasing AHPs in Primary Care, articulating how AHPs best to work with GPs and Clusters, ensuring that small resources are used to best effect and deployed in a way that maintains the best quality of practice. She has led work to improve demand and capacity data, aligning professions to work together more effectively and created guidance for organising the workforce to best effect.

Kerrie is phenomenally person centred; she works in a collaborative and integrated way, with a clear vision and the ability to articulate how things could change. She uses a value base for all her work and engages people to draw in their views to inform how change can best happen.

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HEALTHCARE SCIENTIST OF THE YEAR

WINNER

Chloë George Head of Component Development Welsh Blood Service

Chloë George leads research through a facility she devised and delivered from scratch. This new facility initially worked to produce convalescent plasma to support the international clinical trials identifying therapeutic treatments for COVID-19. It now focuses on examining novel treatments for haematological illnesses, improving transfusion outcomes, minimising risk to patients, and refining treatments for people requiring transfusions.

Chloë aims to be at the forefront of haematological knowledge, investigating mechanisms for improved and novel treatments. Cold-stored platelets have less risk of bacterial contamination, making for safer transfusions. These are powerful benefits for patients with chronic haematological illnesses who undergo multiple transfusions to treat their conditions. She is working on preliminary research into different environments and their effect on platelet characteristics, with plans to lead a clinical trial in future.
